Sue Mason's Whimsical Ceramics

Sue Mason began showing her work in the early seventies in Carmel, California. Her fetish pots were inspired by the Zuni Indians of the Southwest. In 1989 she moved to New Mexico and continued to burnish and pit fire her work. In 1994 Sue began making pots decorated in blue and white out of porcelain clay. In 2004 she moved to Monmouth, Oregon. Her "Trees of Life" series are inspired by Mexico's amazing folk potters. Her current work is now in full color and she continues to enjoy her craft as she enters her sixth decade with her hands in clay. Come by and see Sue's wonderful work.

Woodlands - A Collaborative Mural



A number of art supplies are on the table below — pencils, colored pencils, conte crayons, ink pens. Water media isn't included, but you can bring your own if you would like and add your thoughts.

If you don't want to work directly on the wall piece, different sizes of paper are provided. Make your marks there and ask for a pin to attach it to the wall in the space you choose. We'll glue it on there later.
